What do you know about farmers?

A farmer is a person that raises living things for food or materials. Farmers usually raise field crops, orchards, vineyards, poultry, or other livestock. A farmer might own the farmed land or might work as a laborer on land owned by others.

In the 1800's a farmer grew enough food each year to feed 3-5 people; now one US farm feeds about 165 people.

- How many farmers are there in the United States? In the 1800's about 90 percent of people lived on farms; now only about 2 percent are farmers.

 Workers to prepare the ground, plant, harvest, water, care for animals, inspect crops, supervise people, repair equipment, pay bills and more.
